

D.P. Bhosale



Dr. Karmaveer Bhaurao Patil was born on 22nd September, 1887 at Kumbhoj, in the Kolhapur district of Maharashtra. His native place is Aitawade Budruk., Dist. Sangli. He understood the root cause of social evils and therefore laid the foundation of Rayat Shikshan Sanstha, Satara in 1919. He started a Boarding House at Kale (Tal-Karad, Dist.-Satara) He spread the education to the doors of poor and downtrodden people. According to him education can bring Social, Economic and Cultural emancipation. For such upliftment he has sacrificed all his personal and family pleasures.

The college is named after Late Hon. Dhondisheth Patloji Bhosale, who was a wrestler and industrialist but had a great concern for education. He was well aware of the fact that education can change the social and economic condition of the poor people. Therefore he supported the great mission of Karmaveer through donation.

Rayat Shikshan Sanstha, Satara is one of the foremost institutes in Asia, imparting education to down trodden and needy people. This institution has a motto 'Education through self-help'. The most remarkable feature of this sanstha is 'Earn and Learn Scheme'.

At present, Sanstha runs 42 colleges, 438 secondary schools, 8 training colleges, 42 primary schools (English medium 20), 31 pre-primary schools (English medium -18), 80 cosmopolitan hostels, 07 administrative officers, 08 Ashramshalas and 57 ancillary branches. It has spread in 15 districts of Maharashtra State and one district of Karnataka with 14627 (Female-3717) employees belonging to 170 castes and communities and 3,54,165 students (female

The College

D.P. Bhosale College, Koregaon is an educational institute imparting education in rural area in jurisdiction of Shivaji University, Kolhapur. This institute is run by Rayat Shikshan Sanstha, Satara which renders quality education to poor and downtrodden masses. This college is established in 1968 with Arts, Science and Commerce faculties in the initial stage and later on with B.C.A. Apart from the regular courses, this institute has also the facility of distance education of Shivaji University, Kolhapur. It also runs a centre of Yashwantrao Chavan Maharashtra Open University, Nashik. It is developed getting the UGC recognition of 2f and 12b. This college basically provides education to rural and backward socio economic students. It also facilitates to the students who want to make their career in Sports and Military Services. As this Koregaon tahsil has tradition of recruitment in military and para-military services, this institute runs the Pre-recruitment centre to give an opportunity to the college students.

This college was established by Vidya Prasarak Mandal, Koregaon in June 1968. The inspiration for inception of this college came from Hon. Y.B. Chavan former, Chief Minister of Maharashtra and Deputy Prime Minister of India, Hon. Dadasaheb Jagtap and Hon., Dhondoji Patloji Bhosale. The college is renamed after D.P. Bhosale who was generous and donated a large amount of money for the all the students. For further development this college was handed over to Rayat Shikshan Sanstha, Satara.

In last few years, this college has grown up with various new academic courses including post-graduation. The college has strong infrastructure like academic wing, science wing, library building, indoor sports complex, ladies hostel, support service building, cafeteria/canteen and spacious play ground with standard 400 m running track. The college has very good tradition of organization of zonal and inter-zonal sports competitions and university level events.

Executive Summary

D.P. Bhosale College is established in 1968 with a mission to impart quality education to the downtrodden and economically weaker section of the society. It is affiliated to Shivaji University, Kolhapur. It disseminates education in faculties like Arts, Commerce, Science and Computer Application. It has also taken initiatives in imparting education on post graduate level. In the last 48 years, the college has achieved a great success in all fields such as arts, cultural activities, sports, NCC, NSS, elocution and debating competition, etc.

The college is renamed after D.P. Bhosale, an industrialist, who understood the importance of education for the common masses. He believed that education can remove the darkness in the families of poor and downtrodden people. Hence he has donated a large amount to Rayat Shikshan Sanstha, Satara. There is a long tradition of Koregaon tahsil that most of the students prefer to be recruited in military and para-military forces. Taking into account the same, college has started NCC and Pre-recruitment Training Center.

Criterion Wise Summary

CRITERION I: Curricular Aspects

College has a wide range of programme options which includes B. A. in 6 subjects, B.Com., BCA, B.Sc. in 3 subjects, M.A. in Marathi and M.Com., an UGC sponsored Career Oriented Course, 15 Short-Term Courses and 03 Preparatory Courses. Out of these courses, 2 programmes at graduation level and 2 programmes at post-graduate level have added during the re-accreditation period. Competitive Examinations Guidance Centre, Institute of Banking Personnel Selection (IBPS) and Pre-Recruitment Training Centre are the major centers started during the accreditation period. The participation of faculty in curriculum design and development is visible. There are 4 BOS members, 4 members in syllabus drafting committee, 03 resource persons and 14 participants in workshops for syllabus revision during the assessment period. The faculty has developed the curriculum for B.A. Hindi, B.A. English, Post graduation in English (YCMOU), and short-term courses. The Institute ensures academic flexibility by giving a range of combination of elective options at under graduate level as per the university curriculum. The short-term courses create skills among the students which offer them an opportunity to get the jobs.

The Curriculum is effectively run in the college with the timetable, academic calendar, maximum hours of library. The students are guided by the experts through lead college lectures, special lectures, visiting lectures and also through seminars. The curriculum is effectively taught to the students with the help of industrial visits and study tours. The faculty use different methods like lecture, demonstration, ICT to make the learning process interesting and student friendly. The head of the department take the survey of syllabus completion before the end of semester. The review of curriculum execution is monitored by heads of departments and IQAC.

CRITERION II: Teaching- learning and Evaluation

Teaching learning process is the most crucial aspect in education. The process is initiated by a transparent and merit based admission procedure as per the rules and regulations of the government and university. The admission process is communicated to the students, through Notice boards, Institute website. The information of various programmes is communicated through the detailed prospectus and counseling at the time of admission. As per the directives of University and Government admissions are given on the merit basis. By considering the requirements of infrastructure, college has expanded and improved it. Apart from infrastructural facilities, the college has well qualified, dedicated, student centric and research oriented faculty members. Among the 37 minor research projects, 23 are completed and 14 are ongoing. In last five years 35 proposals of minor research projects are submitted to UGC for financial assistance. The faculty also contributes in the examination system of the university in the capacity of moderator, examiner, CAP director, Paper setter, Sr.Supervisor, Jr.Supervisor etc. The faculty is encouraged to keep themselves update with the latest development in their respective subjects. The staff academy of the Institute takes efforts to organize lectures on the recent trends and issues. The overall teaching learning process is student centric. Students are encouraged to think creatively and use their imagination through Wall Paper publication. The seminars and projects are also conducted on the special and PG level.

The institute is very much supportive to the needy and economically deprived students through Student-Aid Fund. Through Earn and Learn scheme, students are facilitated to earn and take their education on their own. To support the faculty for research, college offers them study leave. The progress of students is monitored through the analysis of records of daily attendance, academic performance, meetings with parent- teachers etc. Formative evaluation of students is carried out as a part of continuous internal assessment, class tests, tutorials, home assignments, seminars, orals, presentation, etc. Attendance of students is strictly monitored and defaulter students' guardians are notified and called to discuss and troubleshoot the problem. The faculty is also constantly monitored through feedback from the students, API, IQAC, and RQMS. The effectiveness of teaching learning process of the college is reflected by the academic performance of the students.

CRITERION III: Research, Consultancy and Extension

As far as Research Consultancy and Extension activities are concerned, the college has organized 02 International and 16 National Seminars and Conferences. The motivation of research committee encouraged many faculty members to apply for the minor research projects. Research Facility Centre facilitates the faculty to perform their research activities.

The faculty is motivated to undertake research by sanctioning them study leave (FDP). 05 faculty members availed this facility in the UGC XII plan period. UGC grants have been utilized to strengthen the research infrastructure like equipments, instruments, chemicals, books, journals and laboratories. There are 04 research guides, 16 faculty with Ph.D., 03 faculty with M. Phil. 468 research papers are published in national and Inter-national research journals. Our faculty has authored books published by National and International agencies. 02 faculty members are working on the editorial boards of research journals in the last 5 years. Faculty was invited to chair sessions and work as resource person in National Conferences. The research orientation of students is further established by industry-Institute partnership in the form of MoU's and interactions during invited lectures. The MoU's with educational Institutes help to provide the facilities for research which are not available in our campus. Interdisciplinary research has been encouraged by organizing 02 International and 16 National Conferences in the college. Apart from this, Institute focuses on the extension activities in order to acquaint the students with the society. NSS, NCC and other departments are involved in extension activities. In the last five years the institute has conducted numerous programs to establish a rapport between students and society. Some of the important activities are Voters awareness rally, AIDS awareness rally, Anti- addiction rally, Tree plantation, tribute to Shahid Jawan, women empowerment, disaster management, etc. Zanj Pathak is an unique activity of the college. Two NCC cadets have been selected for Republic Day parade at New Delhi.

In the last five years the college has organized Zonal and Inter-Zonal Sports Competitions. The college has also secured the general championship in the zonal games of Athletics. One of our student has participated in the Yoga competitions on National level. The environment issues are dealt by department of Botany and nature club. They organize plantation drives, interactions with environmentalists and exhibitions to bring the students closer to nature and make them aware about the issues related to environment.

The entire functioning of Research, Consultancy and Extension Activities is monitored and reviewed by the respective committees. Feedback from students, parents, employers and Alumni help in reviewing the activities and further improvement in them. All the stakeholders of the college are playing an important role in development of the student.

CRITERION IV: Infrastructure and Learning Resources:

The college has spacious area of **3.04 hectares (30,400 sq.mts).** The built up infrastructure of the college is 10012.91 sq.mts. These include Science wing, Arts and Commerce wing, ICT enabled classrooms, Computer Facility Centre (CFC), Research Facility Centre (RFC) and language laboratory. The library building, Support Service Building, Indoor Sports Facility, BCA hall, botanical garden, Principal's residence, Canteen, Security office, Ladies hostel, Shed Net, Gymkhana, Girls' Leisure room etc. The campus also houses Competitive Examination Guidance Centre and IBPS centre. A generator back up ensure that no work is hindered due to power failure. Ramps and lift have been made available for the physically disabled students.

The entire campus is under 24 hrs CCTV surveillance and two security guards are present to ensure safety of the campus. The botanical garden spreading over 10,800 sq. ft. nurtures medicinal plants and ornamental plants. Vermi-Compost Unit and Medicinal Plants Information Centre are also noteworthy parts of the infrastructure. Special infrastructure for research has been provided through Research Facility Centre (RFC). Computer facility is provided through Computer Facility Centre (CFC). Library has been well stocked with latest books, journals, and features like e-books, e-resources, virtual library, OPAC, INFLIBNET, reprography unit and reading. IT infrastructure comprises of laptops, adequate number of computers for all departments and special software related to the subjects. The library also has Network Resource Centre which facilitates the student to get online information. The outdoor sports facility comprises of standard 400m track. Foot-ball ground, Javelin throw pitch, Cricket pitch, Long jump pitch, volley ball ground, Kabaddi ground etc. The Ladies hostel has spacious rooms, adequate number of bathrooms and sanitary blocks, water supply, clean drinking water, solar heaters, mess, common hall, guest rooms, visitor room, store, day care centre, computer room and medical facilities. The building committee looks after the maintenance of building infrastructure and purchase of new material. There is a budgetary provision for the maintenance of campus.

CRITERION V: Student Support and Progression

The present criterion uncovers our strength through the achievements of the students. Presidents Award- 2016, Consistent participation in Republic Day Parade at New Delhi, the fastest runner of the Shivaji University, Kolhapur, the best speaker in elocution competition of Maharashtra State, 'Chh. Shahu State Level Award 2016' from Govt. of Maharashtra, the best state level wrestler, Maharashtra State Gold medal in 10 mts. Open Air Pistol Shooting, National level Yoga performer are some of the major achievements of the college. For SC/ST/OBC students, reservation and financial support is provided as per university and government directives.

Students are promoted and encouraged to participate in various competitions at the state, national and international level. For sports events all the allowances of the students are borne by the Institute. Also the students are provided with sports kits and sportswear. The students who get medals in Inter-zonal, State and National competition are supported with exemption in their admission fees. The students are also encouraged to take part in the cultural events. The Institute ensures proper training through experts prior to the competitions. Educational tours to industries and Institutes of higher learning are organized. Placement Cell looks into the career guidance and placement of the students. The creative writing skills of the students are given outlet through the college wall paper, annual magazine 'Vidyadeep'. Workshops on entrepreneurial skill development are organized. Youth festival, zonal and Inter-zonal sports competitions, college magazine competition, guidance for competitive examinations are some of the important activities carried out for student progression. The college encourages the successful students by felicitating them on Gymkhana Day. Alumni Association actively takes part in the management of the college. It also supports the college by giving financial assistance for organization of National Seminars. Women's Grievance Redressal Cell, Anti-Ragging Committee, Ladies Welfare Committee, and other activity groups take efforts for holistic development of the students.

CRITERION VI: Governance, Leadership and Management

The college has very good, democratic leadership of Rayat Shikshan Sanstha. Our college and parent institute has broad vision of imparting education to downtrodden and common masses of the society. The policy and plans aim at excellence in arts, commerce and science education, provision of employable education, promotion of research and consultation, pursuing industry-Institute interaction, continual faculty upgradation and personality development of students leading to productive and socially conscious students. In the execution of the quality policy in an effective manner the Principal, IQAC and the Heads of the department take efforts. At the commencement of the academic year, both academic and administrative annual planning is prepared. The Principal gives free access not only for the staff but also for students and parents too.

The meetings of the various committees with the Principal ensure need analyses and provision of the requirements at the right time. Expansion of building infrastructure, strengthening of research infrastructure, introduction of new programs, incorporation of ICT methods, MoU's with academic Institutes, NGO's and Industry have led to organizational changes leading to reinforcement of culture of excellence in the Institute. The quality policy

is reviewed through Principal's visit to department and academic audit by external agency, Rayat Quality Management System (RQMS). Participative management is ensured through LMC, IQAC and different committees. This also ensures constant monitoring of the performance of individual faculty. Academic wing of Rayat Shikshan Sanstha, Karmveer Vidya Prabodhini, provides a platform to faculty to nurture qualities essential for academic leadership. The Institute encourages continual upgradation of faculty through orientation course, refresher course, workshops, FDP, travel grant for attending conferences and seed money for research. The parent body along with the Institute provides welfare schemes in the form of loans, medical aid fund, and family welfare fund for financial support to the teaching as well as non-teaching staff. Financial management is addressed through preparation of the budget by the accounts section under the guidance of Principal and steering committee for academic and administrative purposes.

The budget is then sanctioned by the LMC and higher education committee of parent institution. The utilization of sanctioned budget is monitored by the LMC. The major funding received by the Institute is in the form of salary and non salary grants from state government, research grants from government funding agencies, fees of EBC students from government, fees of non- grantable course and short term courses from students. Funds from the parent institution, contribution from alumni, consultancy fee and donations from stakeholders are the additional funding received by the Institute. Accounts are regularly audited through a three tier audit system: internal audit, external audit by competent CA and final audit by Joint Director and Senior Auditor of Higher Education, Kolhapur and Accountant General, Mumbai. IQAC helps in academic audit and recommends measures to strengthen the teaching learning process. This ensures constant monitoring and improvement in the academic wing of our Institute.

The outcomes of the audit are improvement in results, increase in attendance, promotion of research and development of infrastructure. Apart from this, regular interactive meetings of the Principal with all the stakeholders impart a personal touch to the entire quality assurance process which leads to enthusiastic materialization of the quality policies.

CRITERIA VII: Innovations and Best Practices

Academic and administrative audit through RQMS, promotion of research, upgradation and creation of the infrastructural facilities, campus enrichment, faculty training, effective continuous internal evaluation, publication of alumni booklet 'Ex-DPians', Gender audit, felicitation of the meritorious faculty and the students, free health checkup, etc. are the innovative and best practices run by the college for the quality enrichment. The college is proud of an eco-friendly campus with Carbon reducing plants. The campus is replete with rain water harvesting system, solar energy plant, botanical garden, rare and endangered plants, effective waste and e-waste management practices and above all environmentally aware staff as well as students. The Institute has conducted a green audit to certify its status as an eco-friendly campus. The Institute strives hard towards implementing innovative practices and ideas to serve the quality policies directed towards the stakeholders. After the second cycle of accreditation Institute introduced innovations in Academics, Research, Consultancy Extension, Infrastructure, Administration etc. Introduction of new UG and PG programmes, a career oriented course named 'Journalism and Mass Communication' (COC) sanctioned by UGC and 18 short term courses. The activities of the college are student oriented. The main aim of the college is to formulate employable and socially conscious students and in this regard the best practices of the Institute are as follows: Gender Sensitization and Women empowerment and optimum utilization of infrastructure to reform health, sports and sportsmanship in this region.

This institute is devoted to the women empowerment to bring gender equality continuously. Girl's Welfare Committee organizes various activities for upliftment and empowerment of girls in the college. The college makes at most efforts for organizing different activities about the gender awareness. This committee maintains safe atmosphere for the girls attending college. Flex boards providing the cell numbers of committee members including Police inspector and lady lawyer are displayed in the major places of the town. The boards appeal the girls to feel free and confident to contact the above persons if they experience any insecurity. This assured the girls and their parents a kind of protection and safety from their house to college. The statutory Committee for the Prevention of Sexual Harassment is established in the college to look after the complaints of the girls, ladies faculty and staff. It has the mechanism to register the complaints and take the necessary action immediately so that the justice can be ensured. Suggestion boxes are provided in the campus to collect the suggestions and complaints of the girls.

The NCC and Sports unit of our college runs the Pre-recruitment Training Centre. This centre organizes training courses for the students to facilitate the employment in military and paramilitary forces. This unit gives them basic training required for the placement in military and defense services. It has become a tradition of our college which sends a number of students to join the Army, Navy, Air Force, SRP, CISF etc. every year.

Our college takes strong initiatives to organize the campus interviews. Apart from this, the placement cell of the college organizes group discussion and personality development programmes to make the students efficient in facing the campus interviews by different corporate agencies like Tata Consultancy Services, ICICI Bank, Eureka Forbes Ltd., etc.

Competitive examination guidance centre runs the regular classes to help the students to prepare for MPSC/UPSC and other competitive examinations. The IBPS unit runs the classes to face the banking examinations. The special lectures or workshops are organized for the confidence building of the students.



- 1.1.2 How does the institution develop and deploy action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum? Give details of the process and substantiate through specific example(s)
 - As the college is affiliated to Shivaji University, Kolhapur, it follows the University designed curriculum.
 - College prepares an Academic Calendar that specifies the duration of the semester, the date of commencement and the end of semesters and detailed academic activities to be completed.
 - In the beginning of the academic year, an action plan is prepared by the IQAC.
 - Separate time tables for Arts, Commerce, Science, BCA and other programmes are prepared.
 - In tune with the changes of syllabi made by University, the college procures required number of books and research journals in the Central Library.
 - The college operates at UG level keeping in mind our goals and objectives, that is to make students employable through holistic education and skill development.
 - All the departments have separate computers with internet connectivity.
 - Teachers are encouraged to use ICT based teaching learning methods.
 - The Head of the Department in departmental meeting assigns particular portion of the curriculum to each of the faculty member.
 - Teachers prepare a teaching plan according to the given framework of time, and proceed for the implementation of curriculum accordingly, if needed, extra lectures are conducted.
 - College conducts preliminary examinations before university examination for each semester for the preparation of the students.
 - Each department conducts Home Assignments, Seminars, Preliminary Examinations, Projects, Class Tests for internal assessment.
 - Question Banks in each semester are provided to the students and guidance is given to the students to solve them.
 - The use of ICT and well equipped laboratories facilitates the students to improve their performance.
 - The college also runs the need based 19 short-term courses.
 - Each department organizes seminars, and lectures of experts in the concerned subjects.



1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and/or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

College faculties receive all the needed support for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices. They are as follows:

Support from the university -

- To translate the curriculum effectively, teachers are provided with syllabi, academic calendar, and are encouraged to use various teaching aids by the university.
- To orient the knowledge of the teachers, whenever the syllabi are changed, the university conducts or provides financial assistance to organize the workshops on the revised syllabi.
- 15 faculty members participated actively in 48 workshops on revised syllabus for the effective implementation.
- The university prepares text books for some selected subjects.
- The university provides the Academic Dairy and college maintains it which contributes to the effective implementation of curricula.

Support from the college -

- The college deputes the faculties for the Faculty Improvement Programme and Quality Improvement Programme conducted by the university and other institutions and agencies.
- Whenever syllabus is revised, the concerned faculties of the subjects are deputed to attend the workshops on syllabi.
- College deputed 23 faculty members to attend Orientation/Refresher Courses, FDP, Staff Training by university and other institutes to update their knowledge.
- The college organizes curriculum based workshops for the benefit of the teachers and students.
- The college provides library and e-learning facilities INFLIBNET and N-LIST, to the faculties to effectively deliver the curriculum.
- The college undertakes up gradation of laboratories from time to time.
- Students feedback on teachers performance and curriculum is collected to make teaching-learning more effective. The Principal gives necessary instructions to the individual teacher after analysis of the feedback.
- All the departments are provided separate computers with internet connectivity.
- The college has prepared 14 classrooms having audio visual facility.
- The college organizes the excursion/field visit/industry visits etc. for the effective implementation of the curriculum.



- Through the Lead College Scheme, the college organizes the seminars/workshops for the students and faculty of the other colleges affiliated to Shivaji University, Kolhapur.
- The college deputes the faculty and students to attend the seminars/workshops conducted under Lead College Scheme in other college.

The college has taken following initiatives for effective curriculum delivery and transaction.

- The progress is regularly monitored by the Principal and Heads of the Departments to facilitate effective curriculum delivery and transaction of the curriculum provided by the university.
- To achieve the all-round development of the students, the college runs 19 short term courses.
- Computer and internet access is also provided to all departments to keep pace with changing trends in the respective subjects.
- The central library is updated with addition of textbooks, reference books, journals, periodicals, etc.
- Problem solving exercises, field visits, surveys and excursions, including industrial visits, hands on experience and project works ensure skill development in relevant subject-areas of study.

1.1.5 How does the institution network and interact with beneficiaries such as industry, research bodies and the university in effective operationalization of the curriculum?

In order to provide various research, employment opportunities and exposure to the rural background students, the college has signed MoUs with different Institutions/ Universities/ Industries/Corporates etc.

- The college networks and interacts with the stakeholders from industry, research institutes and the university in effective operationalization of the curriculum.
- Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC), includes experts from the industry, provides feedback and the expectations as well of the industry with respect to the curriculum.
- Regular industrial visits are organized by the departments for imparting first hand practical knowledge to the students. For this, the college has signed 20 MoUs with various industries.
- The students are motivated to actively participate in seminars and workshops for quality enhancement.
- Meetings of Board of Studies help the faculties to keep themselves updated to the latest trends in their respective fields.



- The resource persons from various fields are invited for the seminars/ workshops/ conferences organized for the professional development.
- With the interaction with industries or other alliances, the college effectively runs the short-term courses in tune with the industry requirements.

- b) **Design of Curriculum**: The department forms the Board of Studies consisting the faculty of department and other colleges to design the curriculum for the course by reviewing it with the syllabus of other institutes.
- c) **Development and Planning**: The faculty develops the curriculum taking in to account the needs of the society. Duration of the course and its implementation is done as per the requirement. The assessment of the course is completed after evaluation and issuing the certificates.


• Publicity:

- Information regarding admission criteria, programmes offered, endowments, scholarships/free ship, hostel accommodation and other student support facilities are provided in the college prospectus.
- Transparency
 - Admission is given purely on merit basis.
 - Reservation rules are strictly followed as per Shivaji University and Government of Maharashtra directives.
 - The college follows online admission process in association with Shivaji University, Kolhapur (Eligibility forms).
- 2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex. (i) merit (ii) common admission test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (iii) combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview (iv) any other) to various programmes of the Institution.
 - The admission committee constituted for each UG class is entrusted with the responsibility of monitoring the complete admission process.
 - Admission process for UG classes starts immediately after the declaration of XII (HSC) results of Maharashtra State Board.
 - The criterion adopted for the process of admission to all classes is based on principle of merit and reservation as per rules and regulations of Govt. of Maharashtra and Shivaji University received from time to time.
 - The eligibility criteria, number of seats available and selection criteria mentioned in the prospectus and displayed on notice boards.
 - Merit lists of eligible students are displayed on notice boards of the college.



2.1.3 Give the minimum and maximum percentage of marks for admission at entry level for each of the programmes offered by the college and provide a comparison with other colleges of the affiliating university within the city.

Comparison with other colleges:

This is the only college in Koregaon city affiliated to Shivaji University, Kolhapur. It provides admission in the grantable division on the basis of merit and it also takes care that no one remains without education. All other colleges in Koregaon Tehsil provide direct admissions.

Yes, the college has an 'Admission Committee' consisting of the Principal, Vice-Principal, Office Superintendent and faculty members for each class of programme to monitor admission process in the college.


Mechanism – This committee scrutinizes student profile and guides them to fill up the forms. It also suggests the students about selection of their elective papers/subjects.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

The college takes extra efforts to cater to the needs of differently-abled students in the following manner:

- All the government policies regarding differently-abled students are strictly followed.
- "Braille-books" facility is provided.
- Infrastructure facilities like Ramp, Wheel chairs etc. have been made available to these students.



- College provides writers/scribes for the examinations as per directive of H.R.D. and U.G.C.
- A special personal assistance is made available to differently abled student to look after his/ her needs.

2.2.2 Does the institutions assess the students needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes' give details on the process.

Yes, admission committee assesses the student's needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme in following way.

• Personal Interaction :

By scrutinizing student profile and personal interaction committee members help them in selecting appropriate subject combination.

• Bridging the Knowledge :

Orientation of the students in the first fifteen days after the admission is done by faculty. The basic concept knowledge required for the concerned subjects, revision of the earlier subjects is taken during these orientation lectures.

• Parent-Teacher Scheme :

To improve and monitor student, college has special parent-teacher scheme in which every teacher is allocated about 40 students. Parent teacher looks after the student to improve his/her academic performance throughout the year. Parent teacher extends all kind of support to student needs.

• Rectification by IQAC :

Principal, IQAC and Teachers get feed-back from chairman of the parentteacher committee and bring out necessary change to update knowledge and skills of students.

2.2.3 What are the strategies adopted by the institutions to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students (Bridge/Remedial/Add-on/Enrichment Courses etc.) to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice?


Parent teacher scheme helps us to assess and bridge knowledge/skill gap of enrolled students. Interactions between teachers and students during lectures and personal meetings help in identifying knowledge level of the students. The previous academic performance helps the teacher to identify slow and advanced learners.

- Class Teacher, Subject Teacher and Parent teacher advice or guide the student to improve performance and to manage their time for study.
- Subject Teacher guides the students to study and simplify the subject.
- Students with inadequate language skills are directed to join communication skill programmes.
- Advanced learners are encouraged to join skill enrichment programmes eg, MS-CIT/Spoken English/Competitive Exam / Pre recruitment training / Short Term Courses. etc.



• Remedial Coaching :

The college diagnoses the difficulties of learner in the process of learning and the provision of remedial teaching is there to facilitate learning of the student. Following graph shows the details of the beneficiaries of remedial coaching:



2.2.4 How does the college sensitize staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc?

Following are the details of the efforts:

A. Gender

• The college conducts gender awareness campaigns, films screenings, gender surveys, poster exhibition, street plays to spread message of gender equality through NSS unit / Cultural committee/ departments.

The college has established special Pre-NCC female unit with male N.C.C. unit which proves our healthy attitude towards gender equality.

Gymkhana provides equal opportunity to both male/female students to participate in all events.

- "Anti-Sexual Harassment Committee" addresses the complaints of girls and ladies staff. The committee takes outmost care to "Zero tolerance towards sexual harassment".
- "Women's Grievance Redressal Cell" which comprises of Principal, Police Inspector, Advocate and reputed personalities from the town addresses the women's issues and organizes various programmes
- Guidelines on gender equality/ sexual harassment are exhibited at prominent locations on the college campus and even on main places of town with phone numbers of authorities.
- "Girls Welfare Committee" organizes lectures on gender sensitization, social awareness programme, health, laws, rights, responsibilities. It also organizes various competitions like Rangoli, Flowers decoration, essay writing, elocution competitions to give opportunity to develop creative skills



• NSS unit of the college organizes programmes on gender equality, save girl child campaign, environment awareness, tree plantation, swachha bharat abhiyan, adharsha gram, anti-corruption, importance of voting etc.

B. Inclusion-

- The college strives hard to bring the weaker section in to the main stream, following the mission of parent institution Rayat Shikshan Sanstha, Satara. whose mission is to uplift poor and down-trodden sections of society.
- For inclusion of all sections of society, college celebrate special days like birth anniversary of Chh. Shivaji Maharaj, Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar, Mahatma Gandhi, Shahu Maharaj, Mahatma Phule, Savtribai Phule, Karmaveer Bhaurao Patil, Sant Gadage Baba etc.
- College provides facilities like brail-books, wheel chair, ramp, etc. to encourage differently abled student to be a part of main stream activities.

C. Environment-

• "Nature club" conducts several programmes to aware students on environmental issues. It conduct environmental audit of college campus, trying to make college eco friendly. The nature club organizes workshops, guest



lecture on environment issues, street plays, celebration of environmentally friendly days like no-vehicle days etc.

- Dept. of Geography has conducted National Seminar on 'Environmental Hazard: An Introspection, Prognosis and Strategy' in which 124 delegates have participated.
- The college has effective nonconventional energy resources in which rain water harvesting, solar energy and wind energy to conserve the environment.
- Tree plantation drives are organized by NSS, NCC, Nature Club, etc. The NSS students conduct tree plantation programme on campus.

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/ learning needs of advanced learners?

The college has mechanism to identify advanced learners from the merit list of each class. Parent-teacher of respective student interacts personally and assesses their needs. Advance learners expect many curricular and co-curricular help from college. The college, parent teachers, and departmental faculties help advance learners through:

- Class Teacher/Subject Teacher- provide study material to such students.
- Home assignments.
- Provision of reference books, Journals from library/ department.
- Provision of access to INFLIBNET / Free internet.
- Provision to spent extra time in Laboratory / Library. Special reading room is available to all students with reference books/ books for competitive exam etc.
- Encourage to participate in research competitions, national, international seminar/conference.

Thus college not only encourages academic advanced learning but also encourages advanced students in co-curricular activities.

- 2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (Students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)?
 - The academic performance of the student is evaluated by the respective faculty members and the class-teachers from result analysis of university and internal preliminary examinations. Parent-teacher also monitors academic performance at personal level.
 - Slow and advanced learners are identified and guided accordingly.
 - Attendance committee takes regular feedback on attendance, punctuality and reasons for absenteeism during regular classes as well as during internal examinations to identify the students at a risk of drop-out.



- Heads of the department and faculty does counseling to the students at a risk of drop-out. Departments provides question bank and study material in the form of notes, MCQ with answers and text books.
- Department assigns special home assignments / unit test / ask them to solve question bank / previous question papers etc. This minimizes dropout rate.
- College has student aid fund which provide financial aid to needy and deserving students to prevent drop out due to poor economic conditions.
- Economically weaker students are given opportunity to create financial resource through "Earn and learn scheme" to help them earn while they learn. This scheme also inculcates value for hard work and importance of manual work/labours work. They are given different type of work on campus and provide free educational facilities to them.
- Physically challenged student are provided with facilities like Ramp, Wheel Chair, Personal Writer at the time of exam, brail books in library etc.

2.3 Teaching Learning Process

2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print etc.)

The college has constituted 'IQAC' and 'Prospectus and Academic Calendar' committee to prepare academic calendar which covers Time table, Teaching plan, Teachers diary, Examination time table etc. Internal evaluation committee prepares evaluation plan to evaluate the students.

Academic Calendar-

- Prospectus and Academic Calendar committee drafts the prospectus and prepares academic calendar for next academic year in April.
- This academic planning coincides with universities academic schedules. Academic calendar details of teaching, co-curricular and extracurricular activities with tentative exam schedule.
- Academic calendar is displayed on notice boards of respective departments and communicated to the faculty and students through college prospectus and website.

Teaching Plan:

- Timetable committee prepares timetable for theory and practical. The classes will be conducted strictly as per the timetable.
- Respective heads of departments conduct meeting of teachers and distribute syllabus / theory and practical as per the university schedule.
- Every teacher is provided with academic diary which enables the teacher to prepare teaching plan and write a brief synopsis of topic in academic diary. Synopsis covers content of topic.

Evaluation blue print:



• Internal Examination

- Internal Examination committee prepares the timetable in advance and notify to students through notice boards and respective heads.
- Internal Examination is conducted at the end of the semester. Examination is based on University Question papers and method of assessment. It is firsthand experience to student before appearing for university exam.
- For B.A./B.Com./B.Sc./B.C.A./M.A./M.Com., every Question paper is like University Question paper.
- After examination papers are assessed as per the university guidelines and result is displayed on notice board. Separate Ledger book is prepared and maintained.
- In addition university internal evaluation scheme (40:10) is also planned and executed as per schedule.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching-learning process?

IQAC is formed to monitor quality assurance throughout the year. It is a link between teacher and administration. It helps in maintaining quality check as follows.

- To monitor academic activities throughout the semester by conducting frequent meetings with heads and faculty.
- To communicate the findings from feedback from Students, Stakeholders, Alumni, etc. to respective teachers and management.
- To conduct academic audit of college through RQMS of parent management Rayat Shikshan Sanstha, Satara and other external agencies.
- To motivate the teachers to participate in various refresher/orientation courses, seminars, workshops etc. to enrich and update their knowledge.
- To recommend to setup essential infrastructure and facilities required for the improvement in the teaching-learning process to the management.

2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structure and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

Various methods are adapted for student centric learning, some of which are as follows:

Interactive learning-

- Suitable teaching methods are adapted by teachers to make the subject content simple. Most of our students are first generation learners; our teachers sometimes explain subject content in mother tongue of the student.
- Shivaji University is conducting unique lead college scheme to share knowledge of subject experts from various fields.
- Internet facilities are available to teachers / students in respective departments and in the library. Campus is also provided with Wi-Fi facility. This gives exposure to student to interact with recent developments in the respective subjects.



• Seminars, Projects, Excursions, Group discussion are organized for interactive learning.

Collaborative Learning-

- Projects are assigned to students in groups to inculcate collaborative learning.
- Educational visits or tours are organized which enable them to collaborate each other.
- Science students share equipment in the laboratories and projects in pairs and groups of three to four students.
- Several curricular activities like report writing, seminar, group discussion, participation in Quiz, Debates and elocution competitions inculcate collaborate learning.
- Computer and Internet facility in every department shared by teachers and students.
- Under the collaborative learning 27 lead college activities are conducted in the last five years.

Independent Learning:

- The college library facility provides reference books, textbooks and facility like INFLIBNET. This is an excellent resource for student centric learning.
- Students are asked to prepare models, presentations, home assignments, question bank solution, seminars, projects etc. to make them self-reliant in their studies.
- Teachers provide question Bank to students and asked them to solve.
- Departmental library books, e-books, etc. are provided to students and asked them to prepare study material on their own.

2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovative?

College provides several opportunities to students which promote critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students.

- 1. Participation in university Youth festival, sports competitions, NSS, NCC provides good platforms for students to bring out their creativity and talent.
- 2. Ability of leadership and management skills are also inculcated through participation in cultural program like NSS, Sports, and NCC etc.
- 3. Students organize special days like Traditional day, Sari day, Friendship day, No vehicle day etc, also help in improving their critical thinking. Participation in these activities exhibits their awareness about environment and social problems.
- 4. NSS unit of college organizes programs on gender equality, environment awareness, Anti Superstitious awareness program to create critical thinking and inculcate scientific temper among the student.
- 5. Nature club create awareness about environment by conducting poster exhibition, workshops, celebration of environment day etc. All these activities improve critical thinking, creativity with scientific temper among students.



- 6. College organizes exhibitions and competitions like poster, sports, cultural programmes, essays/elocution/debating etc. to encourage the students to participate in various above competitions organized by university and other colleges, to provide them to think critically and creatively.
- 7. College motivates the students to participate in 'Avishkar Sanshodhan Mahotsav' to generate creative and scientific temper among the students.
- 8. At third year of graduation level projects are assigned to students with relative field work. This enables students to think creatively and critically.
- 2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? e.g. Virtual laboratories e-learning–resource from National Program on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through information and communication technology (NME-ICT) open educational resources, mobile education etc.

The college has enough classrooms and laboratories with ICT facilities. Desktop Computers, Laptop, Portable Audio Systems, and Projectors with Screens have been installed at suitable classrooms and laboratories. Faculty members use these teaching aids effectively. Following facilities are available.

- College has Special Computer Facility Centre (CFC) with 60 advanced system computers. This centre caters the need of providing different computer courses to students, language labs, commerce lab, etc.
- Internet Connectivity in all Departments and Library.
- Wi-Fi Connectivity in college campus.
- Central power point presentation Bank maintained by IQAC.
- N-LIST and INFLIBNET services available in a library with e-books and e-journals.
- The parent institute offers virtual video lectures of eminent personalities.
- You-tube and educational CDs etc are available to students.
- Use of Whats-App and e-mail to facilitate learning.

2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

Teaching learning is a continuous process to update student and faculty at advance level of knowledge. College provides several opportunities which are as follows :

• Blended learning :

College provides facilities like ICT, Audio visual and language laboratory. Teachers are using technology in teaching which is resulted in blended learning process for students. Power point presentation learning, use of internet with YouTube presentation and other digital material is made available to student in addition to classroom and laboratory teaching.



• Expert lectures:

Eminent professors, scientists, authors, social workers, poets are invited to deliver the lectures and interact with the students. Lead college scheme conducted by Shivaji University also gives exposure to eminent personality in the various subjects.

• Seminar and Workshop :

College has organized National seminars on various subjects which provide opportunity to student and teacher to interact with experts and improve their knowledge base of the subject.

• Field Visit and Education Excursion:

Science and Arts department organizes education excursion to various places like Industry, National research institutes, Sea shore, forts, University and National Institutes every year.

- 2.3.7 Detail (Process and the number of students / benefitted) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (Professional counseling /mentoring/academic advice) provided to students?
 - At the time of admission faculty members help student to select appropriate subject of their interests.

- Separate reading rooms are available to students and teachers.
- Orientation programmes for library users are conducted to enable them to use internet.

- Teacher gives home-assignment, Project, Seminar topic to promote peer learning within few selected topics.

For every faculty program Board of Studies clearly spelt out objectives to achieve after completion of course. According to objectives teaching learning process is planned and executed. IQAC Committee monitors teaching learning process throughout the year.

• Academic calendar of each teacher is drafted in his /her academic diary verified by Heads, IQAC and Principal.



- Teacher diary is evaluated for every semester which enlists teaching plans and cocurricular activities. Teachers need to give compliance to head and Principal.
- Student feedback of every teacher is taken by IQAC through respective heads of different, parameters like communication skill; teaching ability, subject knowledge, availability to student etc are taken and analyzed.
- Parent-Teacher scheme also help to evaluate quality of teaching learning.
- Feedback is assessed by IQAC and report is prepared .This report is submitted to the Principal. The Principal interacts to the teachers and sorts out short coming or problems. Solutions to these problems are also provided by Hon. Principal / IQAC to improve the teaching learning process.
- Annual Academic and Administrative Audit is conducted through external agency and Rayat Quality Management System (RQMS).

According to roster, Parent Sanstha takes necessary no objection certificate from Shivaji University, Kolhapur and J.D.H.E. office, Kolhapur to fill the teaching posts.
- A detailed advertisement with number of posts, subject, reservation, qualification, pay scale etc is published in national / state level news papers. It is also displayed on Website of Shivaji University, Kolhapur and Rayat Shikshan Sanstha, Satara.
- Applications received are scrutinized by committee of experts containing highly qualified and experienced teachers belonging to various colleges of Rayat Shikshan Sanstha. Qualified candidates are shortlisted as per the number of vacancies and called for interview.
- Sanstha get the designate selection committee approved by Shivaji University and J.D.H.E. office, Govt. of Maharashtra.

Even these achievements are appreciated in the annual programme. Healthy atmosphere and pleasant ambiance of the college increases the work culture among the faculty.

Yes, college has introduced evaluation of teachers by student and stakeholders like parents, alumni.

- IQAC establish a mechanism for taking feedback on teaching / teachers by students. Feedback form for all courses are issued to students at the end of every academic year and received after duly filled and signed by students.
- IQAC analyses the feedback and interacts with teachers to seek improvement in the teaching, learning process.
- Parent Sanstha has established internal quality assurance cell known as Rayat Quality Management System (RQMS) which deputes committee of experts to carry out detail analysis and gives feedback for further improvement.
- Teacher submit academic diary at end of year which enlist:
 - 1. Teacher's methods for teaching, teaching aids and models.
 - 2. Teachers' resource used for teaching.
 - 3. It also enlists co-curricular and extracurricular activities carried by teacher during academic year.
 - 4. Teachers' declaration of timely completion of syllabus.
- Academic diary is observed by IQAC and Principal. IQAC and Principal interact with concerned teacher with fruitful suggestions to bring out further improvement in academic performance of teacher.
- At the time of placements of Teacher University calculate API to promote him/ her on academic performance.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms:

- 2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?
 - At the beginning of each semester, the students are instructed about the syllabus and evaluation process.
 - The details about evaluation process are available on the university website.
 - The university also distributes the CDs of the syllabi and pattern of question papers to every affiliated college.
 - The tentative (Draft schedule) timetable of the university examinations is sent by the university well in advance, which is also displayed on the university website.
 - The students are made aware of evaluation processes by informing them through college notice boards, website, and emails.
- 2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

a) University Reforms:





- The university has introduced semester pattern instead of annual examinations from June 2010.
- University has provided online system to file examination forms, receipt generation etc.
- The examinations of Part-I of all the streams are conducted by the college on behalf of the university.
- Only the question papers and answer books are provided by the university, and the answer books are evaluated at the college level by the faculties of the college.
- The marks are communicated to the university and the university declares the results.
- The examinations of the Part-II and III are conducted by the university, and the answer books are evaluated at the Central Assessment Programme (CAP) centers.
- University conducts Central Assessment Programme (CAP) at each district in its jurisdiction.
- At CAP there is masking to students seat numbers and centre. It becomes totally confidential to examiners and related staff to identify even the college of the student. Masking and central assessment programme help in keeping students and college identity confidential.
- Senior faculties whose names are enrolled in examiners panel of university are called for assessment and Question paper settings.
- For more transparency and to minimize errors in assessment moderation of assessed answer books is carried out by other examiners called Moderators. This method ensures correct foolproof assessment of students.
- At Part –II and III external examiners are appointed by university.
- University also appoints external senior supervisor to conduct theory examination.
- University declares results of all examinations online and all student have login ID with their passwords to assess their results.
- University has started 'Secured Remote Delivery of Question Paper' (SRDP) system for online transfer of question papers directly to examination centre. This is the first stage towards digitization of examinations.

b) Institutional Reforms:

- The college has conducted Unique Preliminary examination for all classes and for each semester. This exam is identical to almost university pattern. This gives firsthand experience to student about examination and their performance at university examination is increased.
- Internal Examination Committee conducts and maintains all records like attendance report, question papers, question bank, mark list, Ledger of result etc.

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

- A separate examination committee is formed for conducting university examination and evaluation in the college.
- The college appoints internal flying squad to prevent unfair means during examination.
- It is strictly observed that the evaluation work is completed within the stipulated time, and the statements of marks are submitted to the university in time.





- For the effective implementation of evaluation reforms of the college, the information about the evaluation process is communicated to the students and teachers through academic calendar, notices, and meetings.
- After the evaluation their performance is discussed with the students and necessary instructions are given to improve their performance.

Due to these approaches, the student performance in the university examination is enhanced and the college has received better results than the university results.

Most of the students belong to first generation learners or their parents are not educated at all.

The number of students placed in various organizations and number of organizations conducting the campus interview have been increasing during the last five years.

- 2.5.5 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.)
 - In order to ensure rigor and transparency in the internal assessment, the system of internal assessment is communicated to the students well in time and they are also made aware of the evaluation pattern.
 - The students are allowed to take photo copy of their assessed answer books to ensure the proper assessment of their answer book to clear doubts, if any.



- There is also a provision of revaluation and rechecking of answer books, if any student desires and applies.
- Assessment of revaluation is carried out by third examiner.
- For overall development of the students, college provides several opportunities in co-curricular and extracurricular activities like Sports, NSS, NCC, Pre-recruitment training, Competitive exam training, and short term courses for skill development.

- The redressal of grievances for UG Part-I evaluation is done at the college level; Student can apply for photo copy of assessed answer book and apply for revaluation. The re-evaluation is carried out by another senior examiner from university panel.
- For the Part-II and III evaluation is forwarded to the university.



• If any student feels that the score given to him in any paper is not just, he or she can apply for the photo copy of the assessed answer-book. He/she can get it assessed from the other expert and approach the university authority or the college for revaluation. This is an innovative transparent and healthy practice of the university and college.

The college monitors and communicates the progress and performance of students in the following ways :


- Through the analysis of their performance in the internal and university examinations. It is communicated to the students and parents through the website, parent teacher-students meet, and displaying notices.





2.6.6 How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?




3.1.4 What are the efforts made by the institution in developing scientific temper and research culture and aptitude among students?

The college has made the following efforts to attract researchers of eminent to visit the campus and interact with teachers and students.

- Organization of seminar and workshop

- Individual departments have programs in which researchers are invited to talk to the students.

The college provides sufficient funds for organization of above activities and gives them honorarium and travelling allowance to attract the researcher.



- 3.1.9 What percentage of the faculty has utilized Sabbatical Leave for research activities? How has the provision contributed to improve the quality of research and imbibe research culture on the campus?
 - As per the guidelines of UGC 20 Per Cent of the total permanent teaching faculty can avail the FDP. During the 3rd cycle of accreditation five applications of the teaching faculty are received for FDP and all these applications are selected for FDP. From this sense 100 per cent faculty has utilized Study Leave for research activities.
 - The Institution has granted study leave to the following five faculty members for pursuing Ph. D.
 - Shri. S.G. Saykar Dept. of English
 - Shri. V.S. Kapase Dept. of Chemistry
 - Shri. D. M. Dange Dept. of Marathi
 - Shri. S.S. Pawar Dept. of Commerce
 - Shri. S.S. Yadav Dept. of Geography
 - Leave is granted to the researchers who have registered for doctoral work in the other universities. College has given 10 days duty leave to Shri.Wadate V.J. and Shri. Pawar R.B. who have registered their names in JJT University (Rajasthan) for their doctoral studies.
 - Leaves are sanctioned to all faculty to participate in National/ International Seminars /Conferences

The provision of Study leave has indeed effectively contributed in improving the quality of research and imbibes research culture among the faculty members :

- Two faculty members Shri. S.G. Saykar and Shri. V.S Kapase have completed their doctoral degrees.
- These teachers have motivated other teachers to enroll for Ph.D. and avail leave under the Faculty Development Program of UGC and when they come back would pursue further research in their areas of expertise.
- 3.1.10 Provide details of the initiatives taken up by the institution in creating awareness/advocating/transfer of relative findings of research of the institution and elsewhere to students and community (lab to land)

The initiatives taken up by the college in creating awareness/ advocating/ transfer of relative findings of research of the institution and elsewhere to students and community are:

• The faculty from Physics dept. Prin. Dr.V.S. Sawant had developed an innovative technology which enables him to give the consultancy to remove the particulates fewer than 10 microns size such as smoke, fog, dust, pollens, fumes, etc. pollutants.



- A multinational company 'Tharmax' Ltd. producing electrostatic precipetors for industries. They had no solutions to reduce the white smoke particulates coming from the chimney. On this alarming problem, Prin.Dr. V.S. Sawant demonstrated the laboratory experiment to Tharmax Ltd. as to how the white smoke particulates be removed.
- Air Tamer, an USA based company, manufactures personal air purifiers. Alpha Smart Solutions is an India based supplier company wants to launch the product of Air Tamer Company in the Indian market. The company had sought the opinion of Prin. Dr. V.S. Sawant to analyze the technical specification of the catalogue and give his technical expert opinion whether the product be launched in the market are not.
- Dr. Arun K. Saraf, Professor and Head, Department of Earth Science, Indian Institute of Technology (IIT) Roorkee, appreciated the experiment of Prin. Dr. V.S. Sawant of developing and experimenting with fog dispersion at lab scale and requested to formulate a joint research project in this regard to develop experiment on the field scale.
- Department of Geography conducts agricultural surveys viz. Ginger and Strawberry Cultivation in the surrounding villages (Jalgaon and Khed Nandgiri). During the field works Dr. D.G. Gatade transfers the relative findings of research to students and farmers of the villages selected for field work.
- Department of Chemistry organizes workshop on 'Soil and Water Analysis' and created awareness among students regarding potable water as well as lack of soil nutrients and further such research percolates through the students to the community of the surrounding villages.
- Department of Botany : Dr. R.A.Tamboli has worked on project 'To study the effect of air pollution on some plants of NH-4 divider (Satara-Pune). In this project he has worked on many plants and found some plant species utilize more carbon dioxide and secreted in a form of Cystolith. Majority of the plants belongs to families Urticaceae and Moraceae are perennial, xerophytic, deciduous, rich in their foliage and utilize more carbon dioxide Under stress condition these plant utilized more carbon dioxide secreted it in a form of Cystolith (calcium carbonate deposit i.e. Lime stone) and plays an important role to reduce global warming The structural characteristics of investigated plant species indicated a significant potential for resistant to air pollutants Our college premises is planted with such types of magic plants which reduces carbon in the campus.
- Research is aimed at progress of Knowledge. Research work have now become a part of the curriculum. This has been a great learning experience since practicals are based on authentic research work.
- Teachers and students from science stream carry on practicals concerned with soil testing, water analysis and measuring pH values of water of surrounding areas.
- Faculty from department of Marathi, Hindi and English have done research which have direct bearing with the problems of backward and tribal communities.

The college provides seed money to faculty members for research provided by agencies like UGC/University. The institution is indirectly supporting and encouraging faculty members for research by taking the following initiatives:

- The college provides financial assistance to the departments for organizing International and National Seminars/Conferences. The amount of Rs.7,40,598/-has been disbursed up to date.
- College provides duty leave, TA, DA and Registration fees for presentation of research papers at the conferences and seminars.
- Under UGC scheme all permanent faculty was involved in 37 research projects, for which the sum of Rs. 33,70,500/- was disbursed for this purpose.

• Patents obtained and filed (process and product) :

Prin.Dr.V.S.Sawant, who is working on innovative topic 'Removal of Particulates from atmosphere by using ionization technique', developed two instruments out of which one is portable and the other bigger in size than that. He published 11 research papers in international peer reviewed journals, having citation index 97, h-index 05 and i10-index 03. His patent on 'Air Purifier' is in progress. Shortly, it will be registered.

• Original research contributing to product improvement:

Prin. Dr. V.S. Sawant had contributed to the product improvement through the following ways:

- Experimental demonstration of Air purifier at different hospitals proof to be successful in reducing hazardous air particulates from atmosphere. This has been certified by concerning authority of hospitals.
- The various models of Air purifier are developed and installed at different places like poultry farms, green house/poly house, etc. these air purifier are found to be effective in increasing productivity of poultry farms, green house by reducing pollen grains, viruses and fine and ultrafine pollutants from the surrounding atmosphere.
- A multinational company 'Tharmax' Ltd. producing electrostatic precipetors for industries. They had no solutions to reduce the white smoke particulates coming from the chimney. On this alarming problem, Prin.Dr. V.S. Sawant demonstrated the laboratory experiment to Tharmax Ltd. as to how the white smoke particulates be removed.
- Air Tamer, an USA based company, manufactures personal air purifiers. Alpha Smart Solutions is an India based supplier company wants to launch the product of Air Tamer company in the Indian market. The company had sought the opinion of Prin. Dr. V.S. Sawant to analyze the technical specification of the



catalogue and give his technical expert opinion whether the product be launched in the market are not

- In addition to this Physics, Botany, Zoology, Chemistry and Commerce departments keep healthy interaction with industries concerned with their subjects by number of ways. Some of the activities to enhance institute industry interface are as follows:



- Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, BCA, and Commerce departments arrange industrial visits.
- The Dept. of Physics extends their consultancy services regarding installation, maintenance, designing and repairing of electric appliances.
- The Placement Cell communicates with potential employers in various industries Tata Consultancy Services (TCS), ICICI Bank, Infosys, Lupin, Eureka Forbs Pvt. Ltd., etc
- Experts from the industries are invited to share their expertise with the faculty members as well as the students through Entrepreneurship programme.
- > The students of this college are sent to the interne-ship/apparent ship.
- Some students undertake part-time job in the small scale industry, classes, shops, banks and hospitals.

- Honourable Lt. Gen. Vijay Pawar and Col. Chavan, Shourya Padak Winner were the Chief Guests in 'Vijaydin Samaroh' (16th December 2016) celebrated in the campus. On that day the parents and widows of the Shahid Jawan are felicitated. Even the soldiers and officers who have achieved awards are felicitated.
- College NCC volunteers participate in the activities like maintaining law and order with police department, giving guard of honor at the time of shahid javan funeral, raksha bandhan in blind school, swachhata abhiyan, blood donation camp etc.
- On 13th January 2017, Water Conservation Training programme was organized by 'Pani Foundation' in the campus for the students.
- To create awareness regarding the traffic rules, Road Safety Programme was organized in the campus.
- College organizes activities like water management, save girl child, environmental awareness, Clean Koregaon Drive, AIDS awareness, tree plantation and conservation, blood donation, clean environment through NSS unit.
 - College follows important days like Independence Day (Aug 15), Republic Day (Jan, 26), Maharashtra Day (May, 1), International Women's Day (March, 8), World Population Day(July, 11), Teachers Day(Sept. 05), Patrakar Din, World AIDS Day, World Yoga Day (June, 21), World Environment Day, birth and death anniversaries of national leaders, social and educational reformers etc. These activities create social awareness, social responsibility and social attachment among the students. They also become aware of human rights,



Indian constitution, rights and duties of Indian citizens and problems of weaker sections of the society.

f) Consultancy –



The college has a ladies hostel to accommodate 36 girls. There are 12 rooms with sanitary block, bathrooms, gymnasium hall. There is 24 hours water supply and security available in the hostel. There is a computer facility including access to internet in hostel. Apart from this, there is a common reading room. We also have the facility for medical emergencies like a full time M.B.B.S. doctor and health center.

• Principal's Quarter :

Principal Quarter of 1200 sq.ft. with all amenities is available in the college. Apart from this two rooms are available for the non-teaching staff.

• Security :

Security is provided to the campus round the clock. Three security guards from private security agency have been appointed on contract basis.

- The college has a health centre of 121 sq. ft. where an M.B.B.S doctor is appointed. He looks after the students and staff round the clock.
- For critical medical emergencies, nearby Govt. Rural Hospital, and other specialized hospitals provide ambulance and hospital facility on request.
- All the students are provided with insurance facility by the Shivaji University, Kolhapur. The parent institution provides insurance to all the employees.
- Through the Medical Lab Technology Laboratory necessary blood and urine tests are done and the medical advice is given to the students.
- Yoga camps are arranged for the students and the staff. For the women and girls living near by the college, yoga training is conducted in the campus regularly.
- Apart from this, college organizes awareness programmes about health issues.



- Rallies regarding AIDS awareness and anti-addiction awareness are conducted by the college.



All the departments have been provided with computer, printer and internet connectivity. The computers spread over the various departments in the college have been connected through LAN. The college has four internet nodes. Some of the classrooms are LCD equipped.

4.3.6 Elaborate giving suitable examples on how the learning activities and technologies deployed (access to on-line teaching- learning resources, independent learning, ICT enabled classrooms/ learning spaces etc.) by the institution place the student at the centre of teaching-learning process and render the role of a facilitator for the teacher.

The college has provided the necessary infrastructure in terms of computers: Net connectivity, LAN facility, Wi-Fi facility and digital projectors.

Teachers are oriented for preparing multimedia presentation and guided to make the presentations effective and learner oriented. Central library have a collection of more than 150 PPTs.





- Teachers have prepared their own resource materials in the form of power point presentation. These resources are made available to the students.
- Special facility like video conferencing through SKYPE is available in BCA hall with high speed internet connectivity.
- As the campus is network through LAN and Wi-Fi, both the students and teachers use internet facility to access the learning resources.
- Through the language laboratory and commerce laboratory, the institute facilitates the teaching-learning process.
- Through the ICT enabled classrooms, the teaching and learning process have become more interesting and effective.

4.3.7 Does the Institution avail of the National Knowledge Network connectivity directly or through the affiliating university? If so, what are the services availed of?

Yes. College avails the national knowledge network connectivity through N-LIST which is jointly executed by UGC-INFONET Digital Library Consortium, INFLIBNET centre and the INDEST-AICTE consortium. Through this network, access to e-resources is availed by the faculty and students.

4.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure, facilities and equipment of the college?

The college has its own mechanism for maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure, facilities and equipment. The college allocates the funds in the following ways:

- Infrastructure:
 - College has a separate building committee for infrastructure development and its maintenance.
 - This committee plans and monitors the optimal utilization of allocated budget for maintenance and up-gradation of infrastructure.
 - Annual Maintenance Contracts (AMC) is also signed where ever possible. In other cases, the maintenance is done by the local agencies.

• Facilities and equipments :

- There is purchase committee in the college comprising of the Principal and the faculty members.
- It takes in to account the needs of maintenance in various departments regarding facilities and equipments and take the necessary steps to purchase the required instruments and apparatus.
- > All the departments carry out annual servicing of instruments and apparatus.
- Complaint is registered through Head of the department regarding repair and maintenance of infrastructure and equipment. The compliance is made by the Principal, building committee and purchase committee.
- Electrical related problems are solved by electrical and maintenance unit of vocational courses after registering a complaint in the office.
- Amount spent in last four years on maintenance and up-keep the infrastructure is 18,75,008/-.

4.4.3 How and with what frequency does the institute take up calibration and other precision measures for the equipment/ instruments?

The details of the calibration and other precision measures for the equipments, instruments are as follows:

- > Calibration of instruments is done periodically.
- The laboratory assistants are trained to calibrate the instruments under the guidance of concerned faculty.





- Defective instruments are brought to notice of laboratory assistant and Head of the department.
- > Complaint of defective instruments is given by the college to respective supplier.
- Experts from the respective supplier are sent for servicing and repairing the defected instruments.
- > Fire Extinguisher are checked after each six months.

4.4.4 What are the major steps taken for location, upkeep and maintenance of sensitive equipment (voltage fluctuations, constant supply of water etc.)?

- Maharashtra State Electricity Distribution Corporation (MSEDC) has provided separate transformer. So there is no major voltage fluctuation.
- > College has a well covered and secured 25KV Diesel operated Generator set.
- College has its own constant water supply system consist of two bore well and a well supported by effective water harvesting system.
- Annual maintenance contracts are signed for the maintenance of some sophisticated instruments.
- > Voltage stabilizers/UPS are used to overcome voltage fluctuations.

Any other relevant information regarding Infrastructure and Learning Resources which the college would like to include.

- The college has standard 400 mtr running track with all the courts of various athlete games. This is the unique facility in the jurisdiction of Shivaji University, Kolhapur.
 - Students of Primary, Secondary and Higher Secondary Schools from Koregaon Taluka and Satara District are supported with different facilities to participate in various sports competitions.
 - > Various athletic games organized and sponsored by the college.
 - The college provides necessary infrastructure and facilities for practice, exercise, morning and evening walk. Ladies, senior citizens, officers and various employees take the benefit of this facility.
 - Our college organizes zonal and inter zonal sports tournaments on behalf of Shivaji University, Kolhapur to expose our students to the expert sport persons participating in the competitions to develop their expertise.
 - Our college helps the other colleges as well as other agencies, desirous to organize the zonal or inter zonal sports competitions by providing the infrastructure and other facilities.
 - As a result, the college has won General Championship in athletic games consequently for two years.

Details of the students' participation in national events:

• Medical assistance to students: health centre, health insurance etc.

- The students are provided with the 'Insurance Cover' by paying Rs.25/- per year only. The students can claim for insurance in case of medical emergency, accidents, etc.
- College runs the Health Care Centre and Dr. C.P. Bhalerao, an M.B.B.S. doctor is in-charge of the centre. The college has a tie up with Rural Hospital, Koregaon.
- The college organizes the blood group and hemoglobin check up camp for the students.
- > Folic acid and iron tablets are distributed to the girl students.

• Organizing coaching classes for competitive exams:

- Competitive Examination Coaching Centre :
 - The college has established the Competitive Examination Coaching Centre for UPSC/MPSC exams.

- It also provides an opportunity to be recruited in various nationalized banks.
- Pre-recruitment Training Centre :

 - The college runs capsule courses through this centre.
 - In last two years through this capsule course 46 students are recruited in military and paramilitary forces.

• Support for "slow learners":

- The UGC sponsored Remedial Coaching Scheme was introduced for slow learners from SC, ST, OBC and minority categories.
- Remedial coaching in English, Commerce, Economics, Mathematics and Chemistry is provided to the slow learners.
- > Personal guidance is also provided by the faculty members to slow learners.
- Provision of question banks to the students.
- The college conducts preliminary examination before the University Semester exams. The slow learners are guided by the faculty to improve their performance in the University exam.
- > Parent Teacher monitors the progress.

• Exposures of students to other institutions of higher learning/corporate/ business house etc.




An alumni association *Ex-DPians*' is established. According to its constitution, the past student, former faculty are its members. The following activities are carried out by the *Ex-DPians*':





• The Principal:

6.2.4 Give a broad description of the quality improvement strategies of the institution for each of the following.

• Teaching and Learning:

Our strategy to improve the quality is to make teaching and learning more and more students centered. IQAC takes feedback from the students from time to time in various ways, analyses the feedback and makes some suggestions for improvement. To facilitate the classroom teaching and learning process, ICT enabled classrooms and laboratories are established. Through various schemes of UGC, remedial coaching, teaching for entry in services, short-term courses are introduced in the college. To provide the students with the employability skills, the college has started various skill based short-term courses. College also runs Career



oriented courses. Some of the initiatives to improve the quality of teaching-learning process in the college are as follows:

- To upgrade and develop the infrastructure according to the changing needs.
- To encourage students and teachers exchange through lead college scheme.
- To solve the personal and academic difficulties of the students for motivating and encouraging them to continue in higher education through parent-teacher scheme.
- > To provide LCD projectors in laboratories and classrooms.
- > To introduce more skill based courses.
- To up-grade the library with the help of new technology and by addition of books and other learning resources.
- To expose the students to e-books, e-journals and video lectures by providing Wi-Fi/ Internet facilities.
- > To provide modern sports facilities to the students.
- > To guide the students to undergo projects.
- > To provide remedial coaching for slow learners
- > To organize guest lecturers/seminars/group discussion for students.
- To organize excursions and field visits to introduce the students to the community outside and expose them to the work experience.

• Research and Development:

Our strategy is to promote research among the faculty and students. Most of the faculty members are involved in active research. As a result of this 468 research papers are published in peer reviewed national and international reputed journals by the faculty. Further the college organizes a course on research methodology. Our initiative to improve the quality of research and development in the college is as follows:

- To provide research facility through Research Facility Centre (RFC) to the researchers who cannot do their special experiments in their departments.
- To encourage the faculty members to develop their professional qualification through Faculty Development Programme (FDP). We have fully utilized this facility.
- To encourage the teachers to take up research projects funded by UGC and other agencies. All the faculty members are actively involved in this scheme out of which grants of Rs.33,39,500/- have been received.
- To enable the faculty and students to search for the relevant material on the internet Computer Facility Centre (CFC), consisting of 42 computers of high configuration with a central server with Internet/Wi-Fi connectivity is established in the college.
- > To organize the national seminars and conferences in the college in



collaboration with the various GOs/NGOs/Corporates, etc. with the assistance of UGC or self finance for the advancement of knowledge and research.

- To help the faculty and students to use internet regularly to find out the sources they required for the seminars/projects/research work and other needs, the Network Resource Centre (NRC) is established in the reading room of the library.
- Rayat Institute of Research and Development (RIRD) is a recognized research centre affiliated to Shivaji University, Kolhapur (Appro. No. SAL/7252 on 17th Nov, 2012) which is a branch of our parent institute. Our college works in association with RIRD.
- To inculcate the research culture among the students, they are promoted to complete the research projects and also encouraged to participate in seminars/conferences etc.

• Community engagement:

The college organizes various activities for the benefit of the community according to the vision of the founder of our sanstha. The college always looks for opportunities to modify and improve the extracurricular/ extension activities for the benefit of the community. Some of the initiatives in this direction are as follows:

- To organize Blood donation camp. We have established a Mobile Blood Bank to provide the blood donors to the needy people in any medical emergency.
- > The college library provides the service to the people outside the campus.

- > To transfer the findings of field research to the farmers to benefit them.

- Enough liberty is given to the college and its administration to spend the grants under its proper heads.
- External audit is done by the Joint Director Higher Education, the Senior Auditor and the Auditor General of the State.




About Rayat Shikshan Sanstha:

Criterion VII : Innovations and Best Practices

7.1 Environment Consciousness

7.1.1 Does the Institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

Yes, The College conducts green audit of its campus and facilities. The green audit of the campus has been carried out as per the government guidelines.

- The Unit of NSS and NCC undertake tree plantation program in and outside college campus, such as Govt. Rural Hospital, Tahsil Office, etc.
- Conducts various awareness programmes like the World Environment Day, Ozone Day, and Water Literacy Day.
- College campus is 'plastic and tobacco free' and the campus and its surrounding area are declared as 'Silence Zone'.
- The entire building of the institution is designed by the architect in considering the maximum utilization of the natural resources. All the class rooms are well-lit with natural light and well ventilated.
- Sprinklers are used for even and uniform watering of the lawns and reduce the heat of premises.
- Gardeners are appointed to look after the maintenance of greenery.

7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus eco-friendly?

The initiatives taken by the college to make the campus eco-friendly are as follows:

• Energy Conservation:

- The campus lights replaced by CFL and LED lights to conserve energy is going on.
- > The buildings are constructed in the North-South direction so that maximum sunlight and ventilation is made available.
- ➤ A solar panel is installed which generates the electricity and saves the electricity bill.
- > The message "SAVE POWER, SAVE WATER" is publicized widely to create awareness and sense of responsibility through rallies.
- > Care is taken to switch off the lights when not required.
- Computers, printers, fans and other electronic instruments are switched off when not in use.

• Use of Renewable Energy:

Solar panel module of 8 KW capacity is installed on office building. The generated electricity out of it supplied to the MSEB. The difference



between the amount of the electricity used and generated by the college is given to MSEB. This helps us in reducing our electricity bill.

- Solar lights are installed in the premises.
- During rainy season, after the first few heavy showers, the rain water is directly collected into barrels and stored. This pure rain water is used in the laboratories as distilled water, which also saves the electricity.

• Water Harvesting:

- We are self reliant in respect of water due to effective water harvesting system.
- The rain water is collected from the college premises in the well through the channels and gutters.
- The well and two bore-wells are recharged due to this effective rain water harvesting unit.
- > The college doesn't spend even a single rupee on water.
- > Drip irrigation system is used in the college garden and premises.
- > The college provides water to needy people outside of the campus.

• Efforts for Carbon Neutrality:

- The college takes all possible efforts to bring carbon neutrality. The campus is a minimum carbon emitting campus, college does not use carbon emitting equipments beyond the permitted limit.
- The College has a botanical garden with variety of plants to reduce carbon content.
- A faculty from Botany is working on highly carbon absorbent plants. Such plants are planted in the campus.
- We motivate the staff and students to do the Pollutions Under Control (PUC) testing.
- > The college campus is green and every year tree plantation drive is undertaken.
- > The college has solar energy unit to produce carbon free electricity.
- ➢ The college follows 'No Vehicle Day'.

• Plantation:

- The college has developed a botanical garden having varieties of rare and endangered plants.
- The college has established a medicinal plants nursery unit. This unit cultivates various medicinal plants, rare plants, endangered plants and highly carbon reducing plants.
- Through NSS, NCC and Nature Club, students are encouraged and motivated to plant saplings in the college. They also help the GOs and NGOs to undertake plantation at the selected places outside the campus.
- The faculty, staff and students volunteers are also allotted the responsibility to nourish it.

Hazardous Waste Management:

The college takes every possible effort to manage the hazardous waste from science laboratories is managed safely.



- Waste chemicals in the chemistry lab are properly disposed by diluted with water and then discharged.
- > Exhaust fans are installed in the laboratories to exhaust the hazardous gases.
- > We motivate and convince the students to avoid plastic bags.

• E-waste management:

- As per the need of college the old computers and equipments are replaced by advanced ones. This e-waste is collected and sent off for further recycling and appropriate disposal to an external agency.
- > UPS batteries are repaired or exchanged by the suppliers.
- The students and staff are encouraged to store their data in the soft format on their mail drives to limit the use of CDs.

• Others:

> Organic Fertilizer Pit for demonstration:

All the wastage and dry leaves in the campus are converted into organic compost through Organic Fertilizer Pit and the compost is used for gardening. This organic pit is useful in keeping campus clean.

> Demo Model of Soak Pit Toilet:

A low cost soak pit toilet demo model is kept in the college to create awareness among the students and rural people under the 'Nirmal Bharat Abhiyan' by Govt. of India.

Slogan boards in the campus:

The slogans on environmental awareness are displayed in the campus to propagate green campaign successfully. These slogans encourage students to protect and keep the campus clean.

Prevention of sound pollution:

We motivate the students to prevent the sound pollution. Even awareness is created amongst them to spread the same in the society.

7.2 Innovations :

7.2.1 Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the college.

The college has introduced many innovations to create a positive impact on the functioning of the college. The details of the innovations are given below:

I. Promotion of Research and Consultancy:

Research Facility Centre (RFC) is setup for those who do not have adequate space in their department. RFC has advanced equipments like, Air Ion Generator, Portable Air Ion Generator, Ion Counter, Ozone meter, Tri-field meter, Electro static DC Volt meter, Air Ion Meter, Flux meter, Light meter etc.



- The faculty from Physics Dept. Prin. Dr. V.S. Sawant has developed an innovative technology which enables him to give the consultancy to remove the particulate pollutants under 10 microns size such as smoke, fog, dust, pollens, fumes, etc.
- > The college provides free and paid consultancy in pathology, environment, electrical technology and organic-farming sectors.
- Departments of Zoology and Botany guide the farmers to prepare the vermi-compost and cultivation of medicinal plants by giving demonstration through a small Vermi-Culture Unit and Medicinal Plant Information Centre.
- The college takes maximum efforts for the promotion of research. Following table shows results of the innovations in the research promotion:

II. Publication of alumni booklet *Ex-DPians*':

III. Innovative Use of Sports Infrastructure :

- The college has standard 400 mtr. running track which is available only in few colleges of Shivaji University, Kolhapur. This is used optimally by the students, staff as well as the people in close vicinity of the college.
- The college provides its play ground and necessary facilities to the primary, secondary, higher secondary schools and other senior colleges to organize sports competitions. The infrastructure is also utilized by senior citizens for morning and evening walk, yoga and exercise.
- College organizes athletics, volley ball and other coaching camps in which not only the college students but also students from schools participate.

IV. Internal Evaluation System:

Before every university examination, the internal evaluation committee conducts pre-semester examination. It creates awareness among the students about the nature of the exam and brings confidence in them. The students are asked to solve the question bank before the examination. This is a kind of continuous assessment of the students. It is done through the projects and seminars also.



V. Gender Audit and Gender Sensitization Programmes:

The college actively undertakes woman empowerment programmes. As the girl student comes from the weaker section of the society and in rural part she lags behind due to lack of opportunity. But this college with the help of Girls Welfare Committee, Committee for Prevention of Sexual Harassment and Grievance Redressal Committee carried out the Gender Audit of the college. It shows that the girl students are more in number as compared to the boys. Taking into consideration the strengths and weaknesses of the girls, the college had provided a platform for the women empowerment and gender sensitization. The Pre-NCC unit for girls is an unique activity. In the last five years, the college has conducted more than 46 activities consisting of lectures, celebration of women's day, legal awareness, participation in workshops on women empowerment, karate, Taekwondo and yoga training etc. to help the girls to be confident to face the challenges of life. On the occasion of Karmaveer Jayanti the college organizes every year various competitions like elocution, debate, group discussion, rangoli, floral decoration, etc.

VI. Pre-recruitment Training Centre :

Koregaon Tahsil has a long tradition of youth joining armed forces. Students of this college strongly desire to get recruited in army, navy, air-force, BSF, SRP, CRP, police etc. So the college runs a three months capsule course through Pre-recruitment Training Centre since 2014-15.

The college also runs Pre-NCC Training Unit for girls to facilitate them to be recruited in armed forces and police department. In the last three years, 51 students have been recruited in the army and police.

3. The Context:

In India, the movement of education and empowerment of weaker section including women is originated by Mahatma Jotirao Phule and Kranti Jyoti Savatribai Phule. Both of these are from Satara district. To continue this movement is our passion. As woman is considered to be inferior and secondary to man in the male dominated society, she is marginalized by society, religion and patriarchy intentionally. We are living in the Republic State, yet the situation of woman has not changed to the desired level. Though the preamble of the Indian constitution focuses on the equal treatment to men and women, the condition of women is not much different than that in the earlier days. As citizens of India it is our primary duty to uphold the values of equality, liberty, justice and fraternity enshrined in our constitution.

4. The Practice:

While going on the pathway of women empowerment, the college undertakes various activities. It conducts gender audit. We take feedback from girls, ladies faculty and staff. Through this we come to know their emotional as well as other problems, needs, priorities and demands. Taking all these things into consideration the institute runs various programmes and organizes various activities such as lectures, trainings regarding their health, hygiene, self defence, skill development, awareness rallies, legal awareness campaign, etc.

Awareness programmes, about women laws and rights, Creation of self consciousness and rallies:

This college is devoted to the women empowerment to bring gender equality continuously. The women's day is celebrated by inviting great revolutionary social workers to talk to the students to make them think and work for the society. Girl's Welfare Committee organizes various activities for upliftment and empowerment of girls in the college. The guest lectures are organized to create awareness about the laws and rights of the women. Through such programmes the girls are made self conscious. They are also given the equal opportunity in the activities like youth festival, elocution competitions, sports, military recruitment etc. Women's Grievance Redressal Cell committee creates safe atmosphere for girls attending college. Flex boards providing the cell numbers of committee members including Police inspector and lady lawyer are displayed in the major places of the town. The statutory Committee for the Prevention of Sexual Harassment is established in the college to look after the complaints of the girls, ladies faculty and staff. It has the mechanism to register the complaints and take the necessary action immediately so that the justice can be ensured. Suggestion boxes are provided in the campus to collect the suggestions and complaints of the girls.



Health and Hygiene:

The Girls' Welfare Committee invites the doctors to create awareness among the girls about health and hygiene. It organizes HB, blood group detection and health check-up camps in association with Rotary/Inner-wheel Club, Doctor's Association and Government Rural Hospital.

> Infrastructural facilities for girls:

The college provides a Leisure Space of 2190 sq.ft. for the girls. Necessary sanitation and drinking water facilities are made available at various places in the premises. The vending machine is installed in the ladies room. The needy girls can also avail the facility of ladies hostel.

Self defence and Pre-NCC unit:

The unit trains the girls to facilitate their recruitment in Police department and paramilitary forces. The girls are also trained in karate and taekwondo for self defence.

> Skill development and Career opportunities:

The college provides various short term courses and UGC sponsored course entitled, Journalism and Mass Communication. Through these courses the girls are given opportunity to start their own business. The girls are also encouraged to participate in sports competitions. The college organizes zonal and inter-zonal games to offer these girls an opportunity to participate in such competitions on the home ground.

> Training by GOs and NGOs, Leadership Development Programmes:

The girls are encouraged to speak in the various speech, debate and spontaneous elocution competitions to increase their confidence, stage daring and develop leadership qualities among them. The girls participate in employment and leadership development programmes organized by GOs, NGOs and University.

> Catering Special Needs of Minority and Backward Caste Girls :

This college takes the special care of marginalized girls. It provides scholarship/freeship facility to these girls as per the government rules and regulations. Apart from this, some girls do not receive the government facilities due to lack of documents. This happens because of lack of past record of girls due to migration, natural calamity and wards of the forlorn women. They are given special fee concession and brought to the main stream of education. In some communities there is lack of awareness of education. The parents of such needy girls are given counseling so that the girls could continue their education.





5. Evidence of Success:

- As a result of the various activities organized by the college, the girls have become self-confident and are able to express their views without fear.
- Due to the continuous vigilance, there is no complaint registered of sexual harassment either in campus or off the campus.
- The skills acquired by the girls through the various training programmes have resulted in their placement in various positions in defence and civil services. The girls, trained in the Self Defence and Pre-NCC Unit, conduct the taekwondo classes in their native places.

- The spacious ground is also utilized for the training and practice of NCC students. As a result of this, ours is one of the best NCC units.


5) Evidence of Success:

There are Forteen forts like Pratapgad, Vairatgad, Makrandgad, Vasatntgad, Kenjalgad, Kalyangad, Santoshgad, Sajjangad, Vardhangad, Ajinkytara, Vasota fort, Chandan-Vandan, Sadashivgad, Pandavgad etc. There are few fort built by the Maratha king of



Maharaji Chh.Shivaji. In 1942's freedom movement, particularly in pratisarkar and confrontation against ruling power people of Satara had active Participation too.

Introduction:

Nowadays, crystals are produced artificially to satisfy the needs of science and technology. The ability to grow high quality crystals has become an essential criteria for the competitiveness of nations. Crystals are solids in which the elementary building blocks, the atoms, are arranged regularly in a space lattice with specific geometrical symmetry elements. There is no ideal atomic lattice in nature, and it would be not very useful either. Certain imperfections of the chemical and structural atomic arrangement are essential for the usefulness and value of crystals.

Five Major Areas of Crystal growth:

- 1. Fundamental theoretical and experimental crystal growth studies.

- 4. To inculcate awareness about wild medicinal plants in students.



It will be helpful to students to practice in their fields to earn more along with traditional agricultural practices.

2. Development and enrichment of Botanical garden with variety of plant species.

Students may not be acquainted with the various plant species which are included in the syllabus. For this we have to make efforts so that the students would observe and study maximum possible plant varieties in live condition.

The garden also provides the class work material for practical purpose.

It is also useful for various ecological studies such as ecological succession, ecosystems, etc.

Spices and medical products are known to students, people and ayurvedic medical practitioners. Our efforts are to make such plants available to observe in living condition to fulfill the curiosity of such people. Through this we are experimenting to cultivate these plants in this environment which is supposed to be not suitable for their growth as they are not observed in this area.

This garden is also helpful to increase aesthetic value of the college campus

3. Demonstration for cultivation of medicinal and horticultural plants.

We cultivate and propagate various medicinal and horticultural plants such as shade loving plants like bryophytes, pteridophytes, etc. and demonstrate the same. For this we have developed shed-net.

4. Green Fodder Producing Technology

Green Fodder Producing Technique is demonstrated to the students and farmers for producing the fodder in scarcity of water.

5. Beautification of college campus with carbon reducing and other plants.

The college is situated on barren land. It was challenge for us to make it green and eco-friendly. Therefore we started plantation. While doing this We selected the plants which would grow in this land, utilize relatively more amount of carbon and address the Global warming. In this view we planted *Ficus variegata, Ficus bengalensis, Ficus glomerata* (especially plants from family Moraceae) along with other suitable plant species.

6. Organic Fertilizer Pit.

Organic Fertilizer pit is created for effective demonstration for collection of organic waste and its decomposition for maintaing campus clean.






